Española Cop Arrested in Duke City

Armando Romero denies charge he tried to buy sex in Albuquerque

Española Police officer in training Armando Romero, 21, was arrested June 14 on a charge of patronizing a prostitute in Al-

buquerque. Romero said he is not guilty

Romero said he is not guiny of the charge.

"I just wish I would've never picked her up," Romero said.

The situation began when Romero saw a woman named Elizabeth Hurley walking along 100 Mesilla Northeast around 6 nm. the night of the arrest. Acp.m. the night of the arrest. According to court records, Hurley, 23, also goes by the name Eliza-beth Gallegos. According to a police report filed by Albu-

querque officer Russ Landavazo, she is a known prostitute.

Romero stopped his white Chevy pick up and Hurley got in. Landavazo, working undercover, watched the encounter unfold.

Romero and Hurley gave differing accounts of what followed and why Hurley got into Romero's car.

The report states that Romero told police Hurley offered him sex for \$40. Romero told police he offered to get her a hotel

Romero, he was in Albu-querque with

a friend and had plans to go bowling later that night. He said the friend had left for an appointment with a realtor so he had gone to a mall, then went looking for an auto shop.

Romero said that while he was looking for the shop, he saw Hurley, pulled over and asked if she needed a ride.

Romero said that as they pulled away from the curb, Hur-

Politics Plagues Española Schools Student Worker Program

School Board members recommend students for positions

When Felicia Lopez applied for a summer job at the Española School District, she didn't think she'd have to contend with politics. The 2005 Española Valley High graduate want-

ed extra money to defray her school-year expenses at the University of New Mexico, and the District

at the University of New Mexico, and the District was hirring temporary employees to help with summer maintenance and moving projects.

Lopez submitted her application May 22. She was the very first person to apply with the District.

"The next Monday I got a telephone call from human resources and they had asked which (School) Board member referred me," Lopez said. "I said I was unaware that I had to be referred."

Of the 27 students who applied for the summer positions, 21 had a Board member's name handwritten across the top of their applications. Those 21 were hired by the District at \$7.50 an hour. Superintendent David Cockerham denied that Board members had an improper role in choosing

Superinteneen David Coccentiant territed under Board members had an improper role in choosing summer employees. He said anyone could refer a student to District personnel, or students could re-fer themselves.

But of the four student applications that were designated "walk-in" across the top, which includ-ed Lopez's, all four were rejected. Two more appli-cations were turned down, one blank on ton and

cations were turned down, one blank on top and

one reading "Referred by LeAnn Salazar." Board member Leroy Salazar has a daughter with the name LeAnne Salazar.

name LeAnne Salazar.
All five Board members were represented on the applications, broken down as follows: President Joe Guillen with three, Vice President Leroy Salazar with four, Secretary Ralph Medina with five, Joe Romero with three, and Isaac Medina

Guillen denied that the Board had a hand in seelecting summer employees. He said he didn't know what the administration's selection process was, but it was normal for Board members to forward

employment requests.
"We referred interested students to the program," Guillen said. "On a regular basis we get calls for employment and we refer those to person-

Cockerham said he didn't know why Board members' names had been written on the applications, and he didn't know why applicants may have been directed to get a Board member's recommen-

dation.
"That's not my policy," Cockerham said.
All hiring authority rests with Cockerham, who said he hadn't seen the applications when he made his hiring decisions. Rather, the Human Resources Department headed by Associate Superintendent

After a budget hearing with
the state Education Department
on Tuesday, the Española School
Board met for a third closeddoor session to hash out its evaluation of Superintendent David Cockerham's performance. "It's a very positive evaluation

with some strengths and some goals for the future," Board Pres-ident Joe Guillen said, who has been a staunch ally of the superintendent.

The first evaluation meeting on June 12 lasted more than three hours.

The Board met again June 19

to attempt to finalize its evalua-tion report, which will be pre-sented at Wednesday's public meeting.

meeting.
"I guess because we goof off
so much, we waste time," Board
Member Joe Romero said.
Cockerham's current two-year
contract runs through June 2007.
Guillen said the Board will not

be taking any action on that con-tract until December, when another performance evaluation is scheduled

Guillen said Cockerham will remain at his current salary of \$115,000.

The superintendent's contract states that he will earn \$110,000 annually, but he is receiving a 5 percent raise in next year's bud-

The state mandated an average five percent raise for all school employees, but that raise has not been distributed evenly throughout the District.

Board Member Isaac Medina said he's been pleased with Cockerham's performance, particularly his commitment to raising test scores and his attendance school events.
"He's had to make some dras

tic decisions, and we supported him." Medina said.

But Medina also said he's con-cerned that skilled people in Northern New Mexico are being passed over for key District posi-

"He's been bringing in a lot of outsiders," Medina said. "I wish he would consider more people from here.

Romero said he took Hurley to a friend's house, but no one was there so she asked if he could use his identification to get her a motel room for the night. He said he agreed and started heading toward the motel. That was when Albuquerque police pulled him over, he said.

Romero said that he had \$30 in cash on the seat next to him and moved it closer when Hurley got into the truck. When he was oulled over, he said, the money

fell out of the truck.

Romero said a police officer picked it up and asked him to confirm the amount to prove it as his

He said that as he was talking to one officer, another was look-ing through the truck. This sec-ond officer found a traffic cita-tion Romero had written earlier, and asked Romero if he was a

cop. Romero said he was.

"They said, 'that's the worst
thing you could have told us,'" he

Romero said that's when they placed him under arrest

Hurley told police a different

According to the report, Hurley said that when she got into Romero's car he offered her \$30 for "half and half" — a slang term referring to a deal in which the patron receives sexual inter-course and oral sex. Hurley told Romero she was not selling sex,

but asked the young officer if he could get her a room because she did not have any identification, Hurley reported to police.

Romero pulled away from the

curb, according to the report, and police initiated a traffic stop and arrested Romero and Hurley.

In his report, Landavazo stated that the \$30 was in Romero's

"I can't explain how she knew that," he said He insisted he wasn't going to

spend it on sex.

Romero said he is in the process of setting up a polygraph, also known as a lie-detec-

"It's what the detectives ob-served," he said.

faith.
"Here is a man who has never

dated, and he has made the statement that he is waiting for the perfect one that God has for him and now his entire reputation has been ruined on a false report," he said

McMath said he went to Albuquerque on Monday to discuss Romero with Albuquerque Po-lice Chief Ray Schultz.

Hurley's arrest June 14 was her second arrest for prostitution. Her first was in December 2005, according to court records. She also has two shoplifting charges, criminal trespassing, and posses-sion of a controlled substance on her record, according to Bernalillo Metropolitan Court records.

Romero has no prior charges,

according to court records.

The arrest has placed Romero's law enforcement ca-reer on hold. Romero was in training to become a member of training to become a member of the Española Police Department. He was finishing in-house train-ing and preparing for the acade-my, Española Police Chief Richard Guillen said. Guillen said Romero has been placed on unpaid leave pending the out-come of court proceedings. "We want to be fair with

We want to be fair with

"We want to be fair with everybody," Guillen said the priority for Romero at the moment was keeping his admittance into the police academy on track. Romero's academy work is set to begin July 23, Guillen said.

He said Romero will be rein.

He said Romero will be rein stated if he is acquitted. If Romero is found guilty of the charges, he will be terminated, Guillen said. Romero's arraignment is set for July 3.

According to the press release, he was arrested March 29 of this year for violating probation. According to New Mexico court records, Torraco was first arrested in April 1998 on charges of robbery, attempt to commit a felony, and escape from a police officer. His most re-cent arrest was the second
