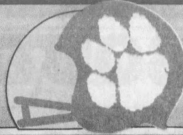

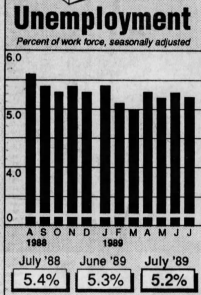
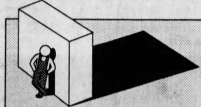

## Teacher charged with assault on handicapped students

A Sirmine Elementary teacher was arrested Friday and charged with assault and neglect of students in an emotionally

handicapped class, while the school's principal was charged with failure to report abuses of children to authorities.

Teacher Pamela Jane Daugherty, 36, of 604 Bennett Street, was charged with three counts of assault and battery of a high and

aggravated nature and two counts of unlawful neglect of a child, according to the Greenville County Sheriff's Office.

Her aide, Alta Gilstrap, 23, of Box 312 Summit Drive in Liberty, was charged with assault and battery of a high and aggravated

nature. Sirmine Principal Gerald R. Haynes, 40, of 310 Overbrook Road, was charged with failure to report abuses of students to the state Department of Social Services or law enforcement agencies.

A warrant charges that Haynes "received numerous complaints from school faculty members that the physical and mental health or welfare of school children for which he was

## Police arrest 14 men in prostitution sting operation

A female Greenville police officer posing as a prostitute helped snare 14 men in a city sting operation Thursday and Friday nights.

Meanwhile, an investigation

into prostitution at Spartanburg County truck stops led to the arrests of two women in the parking lot of a restaurant on South Carolina 290 near Interstate 85 Thursday night.

In Greenville, 14 men were arrested and charged for soliciting for immoral purposes, according to Greenville City Po-

lice Sgt. E.F. Blackburn. Police netted four arrests Thursday and 10 Friday, with more arrests expected, he said.

"It's reverse because usually we send the men out to pick up the girls," Blackburn said. "But now we put the girls on the street and the men come to pick them up."

The city's special operations and response team posted an undercover officer at Rhett Street on the west side of Greenville at about 6:30 p.m. both nights, Blackburn said.

Police target the area, frequented by prostitutes, every three to four months, he said. This operation was prompted by

the arrests of more than 15 street prostitutes in the past month, he said.

"The reason we're doing them is because in the summertime, street prostitutes seem to become more visible," Blackburn said. "Warm weather brings

## Doggone dog is finally gone

Owner pays friend to take Buttercup

CONWAY (AP) — A dog owner's frustration turned into another man's fortune when the owner paid him \$250 to take the dog.

Richard Lovelace just had to give away Buttercup, the 14-month-old, golden retriever-mixed breed that chewed the wallpaper off his walls, the wooden door frame of his house, shoes and anything else in sight — including the bumper of a friend's Porsche.

"I was fed up with this dog," said Lovelace, a 43-year-old lawyer, "especially after she chewed part of the bumper of a friend's 944 Turbo Porsche."

The problem was, who would take her? Lovelace took out a classified ad offering to pay someone — anyone — \$250 to take the dog off his hands.

The following ad ran in Thursday's edition of *The Sun News* of Myrtle Beach:

"Seeking revenge on a recently divorced spouse? Do you have a desire to hasten the dissolution of your present marriage? I have a furniture eating, door destroying, bumper chewing, clothes consuming, shoe shredding, mentally uneducata-

ble cur dog, female; fixed. "I'll pay you \$250 to take the dog," the ad said.

It worked. Lovelace said he got a lot of calls.

"One guy called me and said he had to get even with his wife, and if my dog could chew like I said, he'd pay me \$250 so the dog would chew his wife's head

## Congress passes bill to rescue ailing S&Ls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress passed and sent to President Bush early Saturday a landmark savings and loan bailout providing tens of billions of dollars to cover the losses of savers whose deposits disappeared in a wave of fraudulent lending.

By 201-175, the House passed the \$159 billion financial rescue — the biggest in the nation's history — following a frantic 48 hours of negotiations between Congress and the Bush administration.

The Senate approved the measure only two hours earlier, giving President Bush a victory on his first and biggest legislative

initiative since taking office last January as Congress recessed for a month. Bush had agreed in advance to the compromise, the second in as many days.

The bill provides \$50 billion over the next three years to close and merge 500 insolvent S&Ls and pay off savers whose billions of dollars in government insured deposits were lost to failed and often fraudulent loans, most of them in Texas.

It also totally overhauls the regulation of the industry to try to fulfill Bush's promise that "never again" will taxpayers be asked to pay for losses. S&L

## Local S&L officials don't see problems meeting new rules

Four South Carolina savings and loans — including Greenville-based American Federal Bank — do not meet the tangible capital requirements passed by Congress early Saturday, but none expect a problem in bringing their capital up to Congress' standards.

"As long as you're profitable, as long as you have a good business plan and as long as you are

considered safe and sound, which we are, there really won't be any sanctions for the next 16 months," said Roy Abercrombie, president of American Federal, the state's second-largest thrift. "We're not panicking or anything like that."

Under the guidelines, savings and loans would have 120 days to meet a tangible capital-to-asset ratio of 1.5 percent — meaning

they would have to back every \$100 they lend with \$1.50 in tangible capital.

If a thrift does not meet the 120-day guideline, it would have 60 days after the end of the period to submit a proposal to regulators outlining how it plans to meet the requirements. It would then have the remainder of 1990 to complete the plan.

Managers at three of the four South Carolina thrifts that do not meet the 1.5 percent tangible capital requirement said they should be able to do so within the 120-day timetable.

The fourth — Seabank Savings of Myrtle Beach — was seized by federal regulators in April, and is in the process of being bailed out and sold.

In addition to American Federal, which has a negative 1.8 percent capital-to-asset ratio, Columbia-based Omni Savings Bank has a negative 3.3 percent ratio and Security Federal Savings and Loan, also of Columbia, has a negative 2.7 percent ratio.

American Federal will likely either issue more stock, restructure its debt structure or otherwise reduce its intangible assets — known as "goodwill" — to bring up its tangible capital, Abercrombie said.

Omni Savings will likely restructure its balance sheet and reduce its goodwill by selling off loans or repurchasing them through a process known as "marking to market," said Omni President James Weber.

Security Federal plans to take the most drastic of steps. It will likely convert from mutual to stock ownership and sell all of the stock to an out-of-state investor before the end of the year.

Bill Monteith, executive vice president of Security Federal, said the thrift's managers have met with a number of outside investors over the past 12 months who have expressed an interest in buying the institution for approximately \$40 million.

"I don't have a check in my hand, but we know there are a variety of people out there who have our

material and are simply waiting for the smoke to clear in regards to the legislation (before making an offer)," he said.

Monteith said likely buyers of Security Federal, the state's fifth-largest thrift, include out-of-state financial institutions seeking to enter the state.

While the four are the only South Carolina savings and loans that do not meet the immediate requirement of 1.5 percent tangible capital-to-assets, none of the state's 49 thrifts do not immediately meet the 3 percent tangible capital requirement that Congress says thrifts must meet by 1995, according to financial consulting and information company Sheshunoff Information Services Inc.

owners will be required to put billions of dollars more of their own money at risk as a buffer between risky loans and the federal deposit insurance funds.

"It should have been paid for by taxes, but the president could not bring himself to say the word," said Gibbons. "So we have fostered this unconscionable debt on our children and grandchildren."

But with the losses of federally insured deposits amounting at a rate of \$20 million to \$30 million a day, supporters said it would be equally unconscionable for Congress to go on vacation without fixing the problem.

"For one don't want to take the chance of another bank holiday crisis," said Rep. Chalmers Wylie, R-Ohio, referring to the wave of bank closings at the end of the Hoover administration in early 1933 that deepened the Great Depression.

"The alternative are unthinkable," added Rep. Steve Bartlett, R-Texas.

"The savings of million of Americans are at stake unless we

do something," Sen. Christopher Bond, D-Mo., said just before the unbinding of the vote in which supporters and opponents indicated their position by standing.

The procedure leaves no record of who votes yes or no. But four senators stood in opposition and three others asked to be recorded as opponents. They were Sens. Bob Graham, D-Fla.; Kent Conrad, D-N.D.; Charles Grassley, R-Iowa; James East, D-Neb.; Wendell Ford, D-Ky.; John Warner, R-Va., and Jay Rockefeller, R-W.Va.

"I think it is the best bill possible to craft under the circumstances," said Sen. Donald Riegle Jr., chairman of the Senate Banking Committee. "It will make major reforms in every area."

President Bush was on the phone with House members from both parties throughout the day pleading for support.
