## Police raid lotion studios

Sheriff's deputies armed with search warrants swooped down on lotion studios, adult book stores and a car dealership Tuesday, broadening an investigation into Salem-area prostitution and pornography.

As of 11:30 p.m., four arrests had been made and more were expected.

About 20 Marion County sheriff's deputies, assisted by state police, served six warrants in a search for evidence of prostitution.

Sheriff Chuck Foster said deputies were looking in particular for evidence of child pornography and so-called "snuff" films, in which a person is executed during a sexual

parlor ownerships;

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act. Late Tuesday, Foster said business records and narcotics had also been seized. He said the business records provided evidence of labor violations in the lotion studios.

Deputies served warrants at HQZ Studio, 260 Lancaster Drive SE; His & Her World, 264 Lancaster Drive SE; Scorpions, 245 Lancaster Drive SE; d'Rose's Anonymous Club,

3659 Portland Road NE Bob's Adult Books, 3655 Portland Road NE, and Dick Taylor Auto Sales, 1710 Market St. NE.

Foster said the search at the auto dealership was also aimed at gathering information on alleged prostitution, saying Taylor is the reported operator of Scorpions.

The Aug. 23 arrest of John and Carolyn Lewis on charges of promoting prostitution aided detectives in producing evidence for the Tuesday searches, Foster said.

The Lewises, who have since been indicted by a grand jury on charges of racketeering, operate the French Quarter and The Oasis Club, lotion studios raided by deputies Aug. 23. Through Monday, 14 persons —

customers and employees alike — had been arrested on misdemeanor prostitution charges stemming from those raids.

The followup raids Tuesday, at locations concentrated along Salem's Lancaster Drive SE and Portland Road NE adult entertainment strips, began at 7:30 p.m.

As deputies swarmed into the businesses with news people trailing behind, surprised customers and employees covered their heads to avoid the cameras.

At the HQZ Studio on Lancaster, deputies poured through money, pills and what appeared to be small quantities of marijuana dumped

## Cruise ship hostages 'still safe'

Palestinian pirates held more than 400 hostages under threat of death on an Italian cruise liner floating in the Mediterranean early today with no where to go. A man who said he was the captain reported by radio all aboard were safe and pleaded against rescue attempts.

An Israeli radio monitor reported today that the ship was anchored 20 miles north of Port Said, Egypt, at the northern entrance to the Suez Canal.

The monitor, Mickey Gurdus, said the hijackers demanded negotiations with ambassadors of West Germany, the United States and Britain in Cairo. Gurdus said Egyptian authorities told the hijackers by radio that the ambassadors would arrive soon to talk to them, and warned the ship not to enter Egypt's territorial waters.

Egypt also tried to persuade the hijackers to free some of the hostages, and the hijackers reiterated their threat to blow up the ship if any boat tried to approach without permission, the monitor said.

An earlier message, purportedly from the captain, contradicted unconfirmed reports that the hijackers, who demand that Israel free 50 Palestinian prisoners, had killed 20 American passengers.

"Please, please, don't try anything on my ship," he shouted into the radio from the Achille Lauro, which was reported to be off Cyprus at the time, according to port officials in Lebanon.

The Palestinian hijackers were said to have a large supply of explosives, and vowed soon after seizing the vessel Monday night that they would blow it up if military air or naval forces tried to interfere. Flotta Lauro, the shipping line, said 413 people were aboard, including 331 crew members.

The ship sailed west from the Syrian coast Tuesday after it was denied access to Syrian territorial waters outside the port of Tartus, a

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diplomat reported. The ship then reportedly headed toward Cyprus. A Cypriot government source said the vessel would not be allowed to dock there.

Italy's defense minister, Giovanni Spadolini, said after a late-night emergency session with Premier Bettino Craxi and Foreign Minister Giulio Andreotti that any military move was an "extreme" action to be avoided at all costs. But the three leaders gave no indication of what action might be taken.

Spadolini said Italy had not established contact with the hijackers and said there would be no negotiations for prisoners "that our not in our hands and over whom we have no power."

Andreotti told a news conference the Syrian government had said it would allow the ship to dock at a Syrian port if the Italian and the U.S. Governments asked for such a move.

Onda Pesquera, a monitoring station in San Sebastian, Spain, said radio reports circulating among ships in the area of the Achille Lauro indicated some type of agreement might have been reached with the hijackers, and they might leave the ship. The station could not determine who was making the reports or get specific details and there was no verification.

"There haven't been any solid developments," said an Italian Foreign Ministry spokesman this morning. Spokesmen for the shipping line said they had heard of no agreement.

## Senate up late on debt limit

Tempers rising as hours pass

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Treasury Department used some creative bookkeeping Tuesday to keep the government afloat while Senate leaders spun their parliamentary wheels over a balanced budget plan that has stalled action on increasing federal borrowing authority.

After days of inaction, and hours of bickering that continued into the early hours today, the Senate considered a series of miscellaneous amendments. The Senate was still in session at 3 a.m. (EDT).

There was hope that the stalemate would be ended today or Thursday.

Previous test votes indicated the Senate would vote down the package offered by Democratic leaders and then move on to consideration of a plan backed by Republican leaders and President Reagan, and offered by Sens. Phil Gramm, R-Texas; Warren Rudman, R-N.H.;

and Ernest Hollings, D-S.C. Movement came after days of bargaining on a plan that would allow for a short-term increase in the government's borrowing authority after a vote on the GOP-backed amendment.

However, as the hours went by Tuesday evening, tensions increased on the Senate floor, with Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., sarcastically saying to Democrats at one point, "Maybe you want to create hardship for widows and orphans."

As the session wore on into the night, the atmosphere turned from contentious to icy; each side objected to parliamentary moves by the other. There was so little progress that Dole said, "Every hour or so we'll just remind the American people we aren't doing anything."

Republicans, with Reagan's support, have insisted on linking the debt limit increase to the plan that would impose statutory limits on budget deficits in order to achieve a balanced budget by 1991. Democratic leaders said the sweeping balanced-budget plan is being considered too hastily. They say they are

## Cold sets new mark in Salem

A 30-degree chill early Tuesday in Salem shattered a record low for the date of 32 degrees set in 1900, National Weather Service forecasters said.

Another day of chilly sunshine is in store for the area today, forecasters at McNary Field said.

Chilled by northeasterly winds gusting to 20 mph, today's temperature is expected to peak at 55 to 60 and dip to 25 to 30. Tuesday's high temperature was 57.

Some thin, high clouds may herald coming rainfall by Thursday, when highs may reach the low 60s, forecasters said.

Pendleton had the lowest recorded temperature in the state, 27. Eugene and Baker hits lows of 29.

The National Weather Service said record cold temperatures were reported overnight in 16 cities in the Northwest. Cut Bank, Mont., was the nation's coldest spot, at 8 degrees. As much as two feet of snow fell on nine Northern states.

## First in NW State gives OHSU approval to perform heart transplants

A state agency has cleared the way for the Oregon Health Sciences University in Portland to become the first Northwest institution to perform heart transplants.

The State Health Planning and Development Agency has decided not to require a certificate of need for the program, spokesman Scott Manchester said Tuesday.

University spokesman Tom Kruse said the timing of the first operation depends largely on the availability of a donor.

"I would assume that we'll have the first transplant within the next month," he said.

Kruse also said the first transplant candidate has not yet been identified.

"We have a number of patients we are evaluating, but we

don't yet have an official waiting list," he said.

The health agency is responsible for preventing development of unnecessary or duplicative health services. Hospitals, nursing homes and other institutions must obtain a certificate of need from the agency before adding new facilities or services.

The agency decides whether to grant such certificates based on detailed assessments of medical needs.

The university argued that its heart transplant program should be exempt from that process.

University officials said heart transplantation would not constitute a new service because of the school's long involvement in advanced cardiac surgery and in organ transplantation.

The health agency agreed.

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## Packwood foes protest Reagan ads

MEDFORD — The leader of an anti-abortion group demanded Tuesday that President Reagan withdraw his radio ads endorsing the re-election of Sen. Bob Packwood.

"I find it revolting that the president would endorse Sen. Packwood, which is totally inconsistent with (Reagan's) position on the abortion issue and a number of issues," said Rick Woodrow, executive director of the Life Amendment Political Action Committee here.

Woodrow also warned that anti-abortionists would train their sights on other Senate Republicans seeking re-election next year unless the White House got out of the Packwood campaign.

In an interview, Woodrow said he had called the White House and demanded that the ads be dropped.

"There will be a price the Republican Party will pay if we don't get some answers," Woodrow said. "There's a lot of Republican senators up for election next year. We don't mind expanding our horizons
