A former Ennis High School agricultural sciences teacher indicted Dec. 21 on a list of sex charges was arrested again Thursday pending additional

Deputies of the Ellis County Sheriff's Office arrested Joshua Allen Jaggears at around 12:34 p.m. Thursday pending one charge of sexual performance of

a child, and two charges of improper relationship between an educator and a student.

Jaggears was indicted by an Ellis County grand jury on five charges in December 2011: one indictment for sexual performance by a child, a second degree felony; two indictments for im-

proper relationship between educator and student, a second Jaggears's alleged victims bal-

degree felony, and two indictments for online solicitation of a minor, a third degree felony.

Jaggears, formerly an agricultural science teacher with the Ennis Independent School District for the past five years, tendered his resignation before his arrest on Aug. 31, 2011.

As many of the former students in question have since moved away, the investigation has faced delays.

Ennis police investigators worked with several agencies to find alleged victims of Jaggears who moved away after graduation, including a central Texas sheriff's department and the U.S. Air Force's Office of Special Investigations.

An Ellis County grand jury indicted a local high school student on charges of sexual assault, according to records obtained by The Ennis Daily News on Thursday.

Boston Ryan Prachyl was formally accused of sexual assault against a victim younger than 17 on Thursday in connection to an alleged incident that occurred on or around Jan. 14, 2011.

Prachyl was arrested Sept. 6,

Ennis ISD spokesman Henry Martinez confirmed Sept. 8 Prachyl is currently in the district's Disciplinary Alternative Education Program per district policy regarding students charged with felonies. That status rendered the three-vear varsity football player ineligible for play in the fall.


A historic Avalon ISD building damaged in an April 2011 tornado has been repaired, and will officially re-open Saturday night.



East Texas woman faces life for sex with boy, 13

LUFKIN, Texas (AP) — A Southeast Texas woman who exchanged hundreds of calls and text messages with a 13-yearold boy faces up to life in prison for having sex with him.

Prosecutors say 33-year-old Natalie Johnson of Diboll pleaded guilty Thursday to aggravated sexual assault of a child.

A judge in Lufkin has set an April 30 sentencing date.

Prosecutors say Johnson has been in custody since her arrest last August after allegedly having sex several times with the boy. He had been staying with his grandparents in Diboll. Police say the sexual activity happened at a park and at Johnson's apartment.

Cell phone records show more than 1,500 messages between Johnson and the child, who met at the home of one of his other relatives.

Man allegedly pretended to be DEA agent in Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — Real law officers cused of pretending to be a Drug Enforcement Administration agent.

David B. Webb appeared Thursday before a magistrate in Houston, who ordered him held pending a detention hearing. Webb was indicted Jan. 26 and charged with production of false identification and possession of false ID. He allegedly flashed bogus ID to real agents on Dec. 13.

Investigators say Webb, who was arrested Wednesday, claimed to be part of a canine unit and spoke to children about not using drugs. He operates a dog-training company. Webb had no comment in court and did not immediately have an attorney. The Houston Chronicle reports Webb was previously charged in Harris County with imitating a tactical officer, but that case was settled by deferred adjudication.

DALLAS (AP) — First lady Michelle Obama stops in Dallas as part of a national tour to promote childhood fitness and the battle against childhood obesity.

She'll join chef contestants from past seasons of the Bravo series "Top Chef" and members of the Dallas Cowboys on Friday to promote healthier food choices for students in the nation's schools.

The chefs will compete in a healthy cooking contest with students from a public Dallas elementary school at the Kleberg Rylie Recreation Center in southeastern Dallas. Thursday night, the first lady presided over a roundtable dinner discussion at a Fort Worth restaurant with parents who are changing habits in their homes and communities. Her three-day "Let's Move!" tour began Thursday morning in Des Moines, Iowa, and will end Saturday in Orlando, Fla.,

Woman, man sought in pair of hair extension thefts

HOUSTON (AP) — A \$5,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest of a man and woman suspected of burglarizing a suburban Houston beauty salon and stealing its hair extensions — not once, but twice within a month.

A statement Thursday from the Fort Bend County Sheriff's Office says the Touch of Class Salon has been targeted in the Mission Bend subdivision just outside southeast Houston. The first time was before dawn on Dec. 24, the second was before dawn Jan. 16.

Security video shows two suspects, a man and a woman, wearing white hoodies and with the woman masking the lower part of her face.

Hair extensions have become the targets of a wave of thefts nationwide. Beauticians' websites list extension prices of \$200 to \$750 per package.

Texas toddler crushed by driftwood log

CRYSTAL BEACH, Texas (AP) - A 3year-old boy is dead after a heavy driftwood log rolled down a sand dune and crushed him at a Southeast Texas Gulf Coast beach.

A teenage girl also was injured by the log, which Galveston County sheriff's Mai. Ray Tuttoilmondo says was about 3 feet long and 2 feet in diameter. He tells The Daily News of Galveston County that it weighed several hundred pounds.

The spokesman says the boy's family was having a day at the Crystal Beach seashore Thursday afternoon when the sand supporting the log was disturbed, releasing the log that killed LaShaun Lovejoy Huff.

A teenage girl was taken to the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston for treatment of a crush injury to her arm and shoulder.

Parents of mauled North Texas toddler arrested

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Authorities on Thursday arrested the parents of an 18-month-old North Texas toddler who was attacked by the family's dogs after crawling through a doggie door into the backyard, a sheriff's department spokesman said.

Chance Walker Sr., 26, and Patricia Walker, 23, were being held in the Tarrant County Jail on injury to a child charges. Their bond was set at \$100,000 each. Online court records do not show that they have an attorney.

The Walkers were taken into custody Thursday at a house in White Settle-Tarrant County Sheriff's spokesman Terry Grisham said.

The attack occurred on Jan. 30th at the child's grandparents' home in northwest Tarrant County, near Lake Worth.

The boy, whose face and body were seriously injured by the family's large dogs, received about 400 stitches and underwent surgery to have his right ear reattached. Child Protective Services took custody of him while he was still in the hospital, after his mother tested positive for methamphetamines, according to an arrest affidavit. His father declined to take the drug test.

The parents were cited for "recklessly disregarding hazardous conditions" to the child's safety and failing to provide adequate supervision.

According to the affidavit, the Walkers had put the child down for a nap in the play pen and were sleeping when the boy climbed out of the pen and crawled through the doggie door.

Several neighbors have expressed anger about the dogs, and the sheriff's office had been called to the residence six other times regarding the dogs, Grisham said.

The four dogs involved in the attack have since been euthanized.



Commission correct to exercise care

Being circumspect about a big development shows judgment.

It's easy to be swept up in the excitement of what "new" can bring to the table, especially in the particular situation Ennis finds itself. Developers are talking about an airport project worth more than twice the city's annual budget for developing a private facility and ancillary businesses in town that they project will produce big dividends for all.

But the question: "How?"

Ennis has to be careful. Becoming a guarantor to a \$60 million loan — part of the stipulations involved in this particular deal — is a financial alba-

tross if it falls through. The developers express confidence in their plan, but the city has a responsibility to us as taxpayers to take such confidence as good, but to look at proof as better.

Our Point of View

We don't want our dollars risked, period. Ennis knows that, and has historically made the lowest-risk possible deals when it comes to partnering with business and industry. We've grown for it, albeit at a pace some label slow, but we've grown within our means.

Once these developers "prove out" the plan that has been presented to the city commission, it might be within the city's interest to put itself into the mix here. Otherwise, there's a big hanging question that will eat at us.

"How?"

Another way of saying it would be "Show me the money." Show us how it all hammers out, and we'll be much more comfortable.

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When news is boring, but important

Ennis Daily News editor Nick Todaro told me not to describe anything I've written about as boring. Just because something is boring, however, doesn't make it any less im-

portant. Recently I've followed Ellis County's attempts to implement narrow banding for it's radio equipment.

Just in case you haven't been reading my stories (shame on you, they're gold), narrow banding is a requirement handed down by the Federal Communications Commission. Starting in 2013, government entities using radios have to switch to radio systems

that use a smaller portion of the electromagnetic spectrum; a narrower band. The proliferation of new technologies including wireless internet makes this necessary, as there are more devices than ever crowding the radio waves. Like any other natural resource, you can't make more electromagnetic spectrum. It's finite, and you must adjust your technology to suit it.

Anyone with a police scanner may have noticed the Ennis Police Department running narrow banding tests on their various radio sets and repeaters.

I love writing about this stuff.

Normally I jump at the chance to write about anything with the slightest bit of scientific, environmental or technological hook. It was my beat as a college reporter, and con-

tinues to be a strong area of interest even today.

However, I can tell you right now there's something incredibly and surprisingly boring about radio narrow banding. In fact, I think it may be the most boring thing I've ever covered. I mean, really boring. Like "having to hold my eyes open during court meetings" boring. Like "replay my recordings of the meetings when I'm having

trouble falling asleep" boring. Only the power of caffeine and

the threat of humiliation kept me from snoozing in the front row of Commissioners' Court during the initial workshop.

Nevertheless, this stuff is important. Given how much we rely on radio technology in our everyday lives, we take for granted that the things just work when we press the button.

It's imperative that we do what we must to keep them working.

Let's ignore civilian usage of radio technology for a moment. What would happen if city and county first responders somehow lost the ability to use their radios with any measure of reliability?

Imagine if no one came when your house caught fire, or you were the victim of a crime. Precious seconds are already lost when emergency personnel do have their radios; how long would they take if they had to communicate solely by phone, or by passing messages? Those moments could mean the difference between minor home damage or losing everything you have. They could mean the difference between life and death.

Of course, this nightmare has a near-zero chance of coming true. Both the city and the county must upgrade to narrow band technology to keep their broadcasting licenses, and it's something for which both entities have long since planned and budgeted. It's a worthwhile expenditure of taxpayer money, one I'll stand behind any day.

Of course, I'll be there documenting the process every step of the way ... Every interminably dull, nigh-impenetrable step of the way. I guess not every story can be explosions or gun fights.

"You think you're the only one who hits me? I ran into Roger and Stacey in the grocery store yesterday and I said, 'What's new?' and she said, 'We're trying to have a baby.' She said it like they were trying to make their own sauerkraut at home."

"Well, for some people it's very difficult."

"I understand that, but for most people, it's not a Saturday morning chore. I can actually remember a time when you might not tell someone you were trying to have a baby."

"So she hit you?"

Retired EISD superintendent Harlin Dauphin presented the Jack Lummus "Fighting Heart" Award to Malik Jenkins.



Eat smart for a healthy heart

or hypertension, is a major risk factor for heart disease, stroke, and kidnev failure. It affects about million Americans — about one in four adults.

Risk factors that are linked to high blood pressure include:

- Family history of
- high blood pressure,
- · Being overweight,
- Getting older,
- Smoking, · Sodium consump-
- tion, and Excessive alcohol intake.

For many people, extra sodium consumed passes right through the body. However, up to 30 percent of America's population probably has blood pressure that is sodium-sensitive. For them, consuming too much sodium can contribute to high blood pressure.

To keep your body running normally, you need sodium. Some of the most basic work your body does depends on sodium. Sodium is needed to:

- Maintain proper fluid balance (nutrients and waste are carried in body fluids),
- · Regulate your blood pressure,
- Transmit nerve impulses, and
- · Help muscles relax, including your heart

muscle. However, few Americans need to be concerned about getting enough sodium. The National Institutes of Health and the American Heart Association recommend that we consume less than 1,700 milligrams of sodium each day. However. on average, most adults consume 4,000-6,000 milligrams of sodium daily. That's significantly more than we actually need.

Why do you think Americans consume so much salt each day?

Small amounts of sodi-

many foods. However, the biggest sources of sodium are salt added to food

• Food processing — 77 percent of the sodium we consume comes from food processing.

· Cooking five percent of the sodium we consume comes cooking home or in a restaurant.

 At the table using the salt shaker before tasting food contributes to six

percent of the sodium we consume.

To significantly reduce the amount of sodium consumed, it is important to read Nutrition Facts labels. This is the best source of consumer information. The Nutrition Facts panel and the ingredient list appear on almost every packaged food in the supermarket. When reading a label, check for the sodium con-

tent in foods. The label makes it very easy to compare the same type of food products to determine which one is lower in sodium.

High blood pressure, um naturally occur in nutritional claims, so be aware of what these claims can mean:

> • Sodium-free: the food contains less than 5 milligrams of sodium per serving.

• Very low sodium: the

food contains 35 milligrams less of sodium per serving.

· Low sodium: the food contains 140 milligrams or less of sodium per serving.

Reduced sodium: the food product

must be reduced in sodium by at least 25 percent per serving compared with the regular version of the same food.

• Unsalted, no-salt added, or without added salt: may be used on the label only if no salt is added during processing, and the food is usually processed with salt.

When cooking and eating at home, if you salt foods in cooking or at the table, add very small amounts. Learn to use spices and herbs, rather than salt, to enhance the flavor of food.

when cooking and eating at home are:

- · Go easy on condiments such as soy sauce, ketchup, mustard, pickles and olives.
- · Eat fruits and vegetables often; they are naturally low in salt.
- · Leave the salt shaker in the cupboard. Salt is something you learn to like, and you can "unlearn" your taste for salt. Begin with small changes and you will slowly lose your desire for the salty taste.

When eating out:

- Choose plain food like Madewell grilled or roasted entrees, baked potatoes, and salad with oil and vinegar. Batter-fried foods tend to be high in salt, as do combination dishes like pasta with sauce.
- Ask to have no salt added when the food is prepared.
- · Ask for sauces and salad dressing on the side, since they are often high in sodium.





Griffith served as superintendent for Avalon ISD for 35 years. His wife, Essie, taught in the district alongside her husband for many years.

The April 2011 tornado did roughly \$170,000 in damage to the building, with the roof of a nearby home coming off and colliding with the gym's roof causing most of the dam-

After the tornado, which was caught on camera by the school's surveillance system, the school board deliberated on whether to repair the gym or replace it altogether.

"The school built the multipurpose center 10 years ago," Griffith said. "The Griffith gym was unused, and it became a storage area. It was so hot or so cold in there, it wasn't very practical to use."

The board eventually decided to restore the old building, taking the opportunity to renovate it, as

Del Bosque said costsaving measures, including replacing the old hardwood floor with a cheaper and more durable synthetic floor, freed up funds to pay for a new heating and air conditioning system along with other updates.

"It didn't cost the taxpayers any money," he said.

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








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
